THE SEA TURTLES ARE COMING!

TURTLE SEASON

May 1 - October 31

LIGHTS OUT:

We will soon, once again, be privileged to observe one of nature's truly remarkable events – turtles who hatched on our beaches decades ago, returning to leave eggs that will produce hatchlings, some of which will return here to do the same years later. For thousands of years, turtles have been visiting our shores to leave amongst us their next generations. If you walk along the shore from May to November, you may see the tracks they leave behind on their journey to lay a clutch of about 100 eggs. But please don't disturb the tracks. Our turtle patrols use them to identify the turtle species and location of the nests.

Last year our island (excluding the park) had 316 nests, which had over 25,000 eggs, of which about 18,500 hatched. But from all these hatchlings, only about 10 will survive to maturity and themselves return to produce eggs. Every one of them is important, and you can help make sure they survive by following (and advising any renters to follow) these few important rules:

From May to November, NO light visible from the beach from sunset to sunrise. This includes flashlights on the beach. Both adult female turtles and hatchlings follow the light reflected from the sea to find their way to the water. If there is any light from land visible from the beach, that's where the turtles will go. Turtle-safe lights and flashlights are permitted, but zero light is best. Every year we find dead baby turtles who went towards lights from our homes.

Remove all items from the beach every evening. Turtles can't back up. If they encounter any beach furniture, they can become trapped. Debris from old dune fencing and low hanging rope can also trap turtles. Please remove them.

Fill in all holes and flatten sand castles. Hatchlings race to the water in their attempt to avoid predators. Here, those include both crabs and birds. Falling into holes or encountering sand castles slows down their race to survive and gives the crabs and birds an advantage.

RECIPES

Dirty Coconut Coke

Ingredients 8 oz. Coca-Cola

1/2 oz. cream of coconut (such as Coco Real) 1/4 oz. fresh lime juice Medium ice cubes 2 oz. unsweetened coconut milk 1 lime wedge

Step 1:

In a highball glass, combine Coca-Cola, cream of coconut, and lime juice. Top off with ice, then gently stir until combined, about 5 seconds.

Step 2:

Slowly add coconut milk to achieve the gradient color. Garnish with lime wedge.



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Ingredients: 6 mint sprigs, divided Ice 6 oz. Ginger Ale 1 oz. fresh lime juice 1/2 oz. pure maple syrup Lime wedges, for garnish

Step 1: Gently brush 1 mint sprig against top of a tall glass to release aromatics.

Step 2: Place remaining 5 mint sprigs in bottom of prepared glass. Fill glass with ice. Add ginger ale, lime juice, and syrup. Gently stir until combined.

> **Step 3:** Top off with ice, mint sprigs and lime wedges.
