

Photo Contest Winners Named


More than a dozen individuals submitted 34 photos for this year's ArtSocial Photo Contest.

Attention St. George Island, including the Plantation! If you are feeding or if you observe community cats on the island we can help! SGI Cat Allies, Inc. is a fully qualified Florida 501(c)(3) nonprofit, that has trapped/neutered/vaccinated/returned 2,524 Franklin County felines in the last 11 years, at no cost to the caregivers. We operate on donations alone, and appreciate your support.

We will be trapping on St. George Island and surrounding areas November 15 and 16. If you need help with cats in your area, please TEXT the information to our scheduling number ASAP! (850) 888-0499. Include your name, approximate number of cats needing help, and location of cat or colony.



After trapping the cats, and following a very strict humane protocol designed by Operation Catnip, Gainesville, we will shelter them and transport them to and from Operation Spay Bay in Panama City for surgery. All cats will be returned to their trapped location 24 hours after surgery.

2025 Turtle Report

This year's turtle nesting season saw a hatch success rate of just under 72%, with 70% of loggerheads hatching and 89% of all green sea turtles.

In total, 27,288 eggs hatched this year on St. George Island – 22,552 loggerheads and 4,736 greens. The average incubation time was 52 days, slightly longer for the greens. An average nest had 79 eggs.

The last turtle nest, which was within the Plantation, was dug October 26. It yielded 133 unhatched eggs. The nest had been washed over many times.

Sea turtles are a keystone species vital for a healthy marine ecosystem and coastal environments. They maintain healthy seagrass beds and coral reefs,

Both loggerheads and green sea turtles are native to our waters. How to tell the difference? Loggerheads have a teardrop shaped shell. The green's shell is more oval. Loggerheads will have the larger, stockier heads.

bring nutrients to beaches through their eggs and shells, and help with nutrient cycling and coastal erosion control. Protecting them also safeguards other marine life and supports ecotourism.

Owners have a recycling option with Florida 27 Recycle

Plantation owners now have a recycling option. Florida 27 Recycle serves St. George Island, Apalachicola, Eastpoint, Carrabelle and Port St. Joe. There is a monthly fee for weekly pick-up service. Users may choose an 18-gallon tote or a 48-gallon bin. Bear locks can be installed on the large bins, which are also less likely to have contents scattered during high winds. Collection is single-stream, with all recyclables placed in the same bin.

Accepted Materials: (All should be emptied and rinsed.)

- Plastic shopping bags.
- Cartons: Milk, juice and soups.
- Metal Cans: Soda, beer and canned foods.
- Glass Bottles and Jars: Beverages, sauces, and preserves. Lids should be removed.
- Paper and Cardboard: Newspapers, magazines and shipping boxes. Items should be clean and free of food residue.
- Plastic Bottles and Containers: Such as those for beverages, shampoos and detergents. Caps should be removed.

Red Pepper Pasta With Roasted Cauliflower

Source: Pinch of Yum

Ingredients:

- 2 heads of cauliflower, cut into florets
- 2 T. olive oil & pinch of salt

For Sauce & Pasta:

- ¾ cup cashews
- ¾ cup water
- 1 t. salt
- 1 jar (25 oz) pasta sauce
- 1 jar (16 oz) roasted red peppers, drained
- 1 lb. whole wheat penne pasta
- greens for garnishing

Instructions:

- Cauliflower: Preheat the oven to 425 degrees. Toss the cauliflower florets with olive oil and salt and spread on a baking sheet. Bake/roast for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally, until nice and brown.
- Creamy Tomato Sauce: Blend the cashews, water, salt, pasta sauce, and red peppers together until very smooth and creamy.
- Pasta: Cook pasta according to package directions. Toss cooked pasta with some of the sauce (however much you want – you'll have some left over) and most of the roasted cauliflower. (You can reserve a little to make a fancy topping.)



The Plantation was legally born in September 1977 with Franklin County's approval of the St. George Island Development Order. The schooner was part of the original Plantation logo and was used on advertising, letterhead, and clothing. Originally called St. George's Plantation, the "s" was later dropped to simplify the name.

Dune Planting Recommendations

From the Florida Department of Environmental Protection/Coastal Construction Control Line Program

"Beach-dune plant" refers to sea oats, bitter panic grass, railroad vine, beach morning glory, beach elder, seapurslane, and other native grasses and groundcovers growing in the pioneer and frontal dune zones of the beach and dune system. These native dune plants stabilize dunes by anchoring the sand with root systems that resist erosion. They are adapted to the

beach's inhospitable growing conditions, salt spray and periodic saltwater flooding, sand blasting and burial, nutrient poor and droughty sands, and recovery after storms.



Sea oats are an ideal choice for about any beach or dune site. They establish easily and start trapping windblown sand and building up elevation relatively quickly. Sea oats tend to grow vertically with the dune. Research shows that sea oats sourced from local stock perform the best. (see www.fann.org). Plant bare root or boxed and shipped sea oats within 3 days of purchase.

Plant as far landward on the beach and dune system as possible, no farther out on the beach than the existing line of dune vegetation in the area.



Planting deeply and making sure that the roots are in moist soil is key to the oats' survival, as the top layer of sand heats up and oven dries under direct sunlight and wind. Wind erosion can lower the sand surface, exposing rootballs to drying sun and air.

Dry sand is difficult to plant into as the sand slides back into the hole. Make a test hole to know how deep the sand is that is more cohesive and feels damp and cooler to the touch. Plants are most easily installed in damp sand; the area can be moistened before planting. Using hydrating gels increases the survival rate.

Plant, backfill and tamp the soil around the plug. Bury the top of the planting unit rootball deep enough to be in damp sand, 6-inches or more below the soil surface. Install smaller plants so that at least 3-inches of leaves and stem remain above the sand. More info can be found here.
