Sometimes these elements are highly visible, like upgrading boardwalks, and sometimes they are behind the scenes, like progress with the status of our annual audit.



For this Plantation Post, I would like to point out a couple of projects that are making great progress.

As you walk, bike, or drive around the community, take a look at the **fire hydrants**. If you have paid attention to these over the last few years, you may have noticed they appeared in poor condition. We have been able to work with Water Management and the SGI Volunteer Fire Department to begin having the fire hydrants cleaned, painted, and tested. Not only will the appearance be better, I'll rest easier knowing that this critical part of our infrastructure is in top shape if there is a need to use them.

I'm particularly proud of our Plantation team pulling together to handle some infrastructure maintenance items. Be sure to look at enhancements to the beachside **boardwalks** as the Maintenance team works to refurbish ones that need attention. There has also been **brush clearing** around other vendor infrastructure items - all those boxes for cable, fiber, and power. If you can't see it, how do you know it is there?

Discussions have begun on how to expand and renovate the **gym** at the Plantation Clubhouse. If you have been to this facility during peak times, you know it is a crowded space. Look for more information on this in the coming months and please plan on participating so that your voices are heard during the planning stage.

Updates for the ARC

Tracee Sealy was recently named to the SGPOA Architectural Review Committee (ARC). She replaces Billy Schultz, whose term was up in late 2025.

The Committee will consider two additional candidates in the Feb. 12 meeting, as a replacement for Ken Goodman who resigned in January.

Additionally, SGPOA has contracted Mike Weiksner, J.M. Weiksner Sr. PE, as the primary CRE (Contract Review Engineer) for the review of ARC plans. George Johnson with Johnson & Miller Inc. is the backup CRA (Contract Review Architect). ARC meets the second Thursday of every month at 1 p.m.

Did You Know?

Here's a timeline reflecting events on SGI from the Fla. Natural Areas Inventory:

1528 – Spanish explorer Panfilo de Narvaez visited a location near present-day Apalachicola. His expedition journal describes a coastal island that is believed to be Dog Island, St. Vincent Island, or St. George Island. DeSoto's party in 1539 probably sighted St. George Island as well.

1833 – A lighthouse was built at West Pass and moved to Cape St. George in 1848.

1852 – The lighthouse was destroyed by a hurricane and rebuilt on a location further inland, on Little St. George Island.

1861 – The Union had a blockade in the St. George area, although some vessels did enter and leave without Union interception.

After 1870 – A fire at the Franklin County Courthouse destroyed many of the county's land records including any source title for St. George Island.

1881 – Horace H. Humphries buys one-third of St. George Island for \$21.

After 1910 – The St. George Island Company is formed by George W. Saxon from Tallahassee. A bayside wharf was built and in 1911 a small hotel called the Club House was built on St. George Island. Some lots were sold for \$250 but very few cottages were built. Saxon decides to sell the island in 1916.

1921 – Baptist preacher William Popham bought the island for \$27,224.50. Four years later he is convicted of mail fraud, serving less than 2 years.

1940 – Ownership of the island was passed to William H. Wilson.

1942 – The U.S. Government took control of the island for the duration of World War II.

Successes in Leadership

In 2025, Administrative Leadership accomplished the following:

- Filled all SGPOA administrative staffing vacancies and 90% of all support positions in both maintenance and security, thereby providing the needed staff to address owner needs.
- Held regular employee celebration luncheons to recognize, inspire, thank and update staff, supporting employee engagement and retention.
- Initiated SWOT analysis among administrative staff to address Strengths, Weakness, Opportunities, and Threats to promote initiative-taking versus reactive responses.
- Held a successful Annual Owners' Meeting in October, with 140 in attendance and 366 owners voting.
- Increased communications overall with summaries presented to the BOD at monthly meetings and elevated communications for all BOD and Committee meetings.
- Completion of the 2026 Budget and establishing a stronger schedule for the budgeting process going forward, ensuring greater transparency and notice

by presenting draft budget at Annual Owners' Meeting in October.

- Emphasizing a hospitality training focus for all office staff, security and any employee who interacts with owners and guests to provide a higher level of service.
- Partnering with the Facilities Manager to facilitate repairs and improvements for the safety and enjoyment of all owners/guests.
- GM has increased interaction with owners through his involvement with the board, committees, problem-solving and speaking one-on-one with owners, assuring the resolution of issues in a timely manner.

Marry Me Chicken

A dish so good, makes you want to marry the chef! Cook time is 30 minutes.

Ingredients:

- Kosher salt & fresh ground pepper
- 8 oz. spaghetti
- 3 T. olive oil
- Four 6-oz. boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1 lrg. shallot, sliced thin
- 2 minced garlic cloves
- 1 c. low-salt chicken broth
- One 6.3-oz jar sundried tomatoes in oil, drained & chopped
- One small chicken bouillon cube
- 1 c. heavy cream
- 1 t. dried oregano
- $\frac{1}{4}$ t. crushed red pepper flakes
- $\frac{1}{2}$ c. freshly grated Parmesan
- $\frac{1}{4}$ c. thinly sliced fresh basil

Instructions:

Bring a large pot of water to boil over medium-high heat. Season water with salt. Add pasta & cook according to pkg. directions; drain and set aside. Keep warm.

Heat 2 T. of oil in large skillet over medium-high heat. Salt & pepper chicken on both sides. Add to the skillet & cook until golden brown on the bottom, about 5 minutes. Flip with tongs and continue to cook until golden brown on the other side, about 5 minutes more. Remove to a plate.



Add remaining 1 T. oil & the shallot to the same skillet. Cook, stirring occasionally, until tender, 1-2 minutes. Add the garlic and cook, stirring continuously about 1 minute more. Add the chicken broth and scrape up any browned bits from the bottom. Add the sundried tomatoes, bouillon cube, heavy cream, oregano, red pepper flakes and $\frac{1}{4}$ t. salt. Stir until the bouillon cube is dissolved.

Bring the sauce to a boil, then reduce to a simmer over medium-low heat. Place chicken in the sauce. Cook until the sauce has thickened slightly and the chicken is cooked through (165 degrees), 5-10 minutes. Stir in Parmesan & basil. Divide among 4 plates & serve with spaghetti.
